PROGRAM OVERVIEW & OUTCOMES

This program is presented by the MidAtlantic AIDS Education and Training Center Headquarters and Local Partner Sites (LPS) (University of Pittsburgh LPS, Health Federation of Philadelphia LPS, University of Maryland, Baltimore LPS, Johns Hopkins University LPS, Howard University LPS, ChristianaCare LPS, Virginia Commonwealth University LPS, Northern Virginia/Inova Health System LPS, and West Virginia University LPS), in collaboration with Allegheny Health Network - Positive Health Clinic, Pittsburgh Area Center for Treatment (PACT), and Shepherd Wellness Community.
